Boating Education



Winter Social Activities

January Zoom Social - Twenty-Three members of ABCW enjoyed camaraderie online, while avoiding the need to travel in cold snowy weather! Speaker Allison Robb, maritime archaeologist, spoke on *The Bridge to France: Life of One of the Mallows Bay Ghost Fleet Vessels*". Compelling and thought-provoking, Ph.D. candidate Robb discussed the history of *Aowa* and its life, from conception with the wooden shipbuilding program, to its final abandonment in Mallows Bay. She explained that her research focuses on the relationship between factors influencing wooden shipwreck degradation, microbial communities, water chemistry, historical uses and archaeological depositional activities. She has worked on submerged archaeological sites around the world, including the South Pacific, Florida, and the Great Lakes. Our members thoroughly enjoyed the presentation!

February Zoom Social - Members of **America's Boating Club Wilmington** enjoyed warm winter socializing and a fascinating presentation by David Gendell during their February Founder's Day Zoom Social. Among the twenty-seven members present, joining us from afar were Sandy and Dave Netting in North Carolina, as well as Joan and Bill Barber, and Donna and Bill Zimmerman from their boats in the sunny Bahamas. Our speaker, Mr. Gendell, presented a slide show reviewing his new book, "The Last Days of the Schooner AMERICA: A Lost Icon at the Annapolis Warship Factory" (Lyons Press, 2024). He explained how *AMERICA* was an 1850's technological marvel. In the summer of 1851, just weeks after a New York launch, she crossed the Atlantic to an upset victory against a fleet of champions. To this day the silver America's Cup, named after her, is still coveted by sportsmen. His book traces *AMERICA*'s history from design, build, and early racing career through her lesser-known Civil War service and the never-before-told story of her final days in Annapolis. Mr. Gendell is an Annapolis native with extensive sailboat racing and passage making experience. In 1995, he co-founded *SpinSheet* and served as editor for twelve years. In 2004, he co-founded *Prop Talk*, a Chesapeake Bay power boating magazine. He also authored the first and only book devoted to the 1875 Thomas Point Lighthouse, "Thomas Point Shoal Lighthouse: A Chesapeake Bay Icon" (The History Press, 2020). An excellent presenter, we hope to have him back again!

Environmental Best Practices for Boaters

Vessel Maintenance

- Wash boat regularly with fresh water to avoid frequent use of harsh detergents.
- Choose phosphate-free, biodegradable and non-toxic cleaners.
- Waxing & buffing requires less use of cleaning solutions and your boat looks better!
- Try to do major cleaning and maintenance tasks when boat is out of the water.
- Conserve water by using a spray nozzle on the hose.
- Use drop cloth when sanding and scraping - collect all paint chips, dust and other residue, and dispose of properly.
- Share leftover paint and varnish.
- Dispose of solvents and waste gas at local hazardous waste collection sites.
- Use environmentally safe anti-fouling paints and follow manufacturer's instructions.
- Recycle used zincs.
- Keep engine(s) tuned: this reduces carbon monoxide emissions when moored, reduces hydrocarbon and soot emissions into the air, and saves fuel.
- Dispose of drained oil and any spent or spilled coolant at appropriate recycling centers when performing maintenance yourself.

Mariner's Environmental Awareness

- When fishing-keep only those fish you intend to eat practice "catch and release" techniques to insure survival of those you throw back.
- Proceed slowly in shallow areas and do not disturb wildlife.
- Avoid stirring up bottom—suspended sediment limits light penetration and depletes oxygen.
- Sea otters, sea lions, manatees, whales and other sea mammals can be injured by impact with boats at higher speeds avoid areas of high animal population or proceed slowly.
- Report any injured animal to local wildlife authorities—many times the life can be saved.
- Protect waters from nuisance, invasive species—remove any visible mud, plants, fish or animals before transporting. Clean and dry anything that comes in contact with the water (boats, trailers, equipment, clothing, dogs, etc.)
- Never release plants, fish or animals into a body of water unless they came from that body of water. Bilge water can also transport invasive species.
- High wake causes shoreline erosion and destruction of habitat.
