Cooperative Charting

Do you know your flags?

The other day I was out on the water doing some nautical chart updates and I notice some flag flying on other vessels. I later learned the flags were called International Code flags. I wonder how many of the flags you can recognize and tell someone their meaning.

The first flag I saw was the white and blue Alpha flag swallow tail flag. According to my chart, they must have been exploring around a symbol for a sunken wreck with PA noted next to the symbol. The PA stands for Position Approximate. NOAA wants to know if there really is a wreck down there. If so, what is the depth of the water above its highest point, and its exact location so the wreck can be accurately plotted on a chart?



I would guess that most of us know this flag by an-



other design better know as the scuba diver flag. Either one of these flags tells you to stay clear that divers are conducting diving operations. We see these flags in the windows of dive shops and on boat usually in warmer waters.

Another flag I saw was the white and red Hotel flag. This flag indicates a pilot vessel on duty and under-



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Boating Safety News

October is Fire Prevention Month

By the time you receive this Lubber's Line, Fire Prevention Month could be history. What the heck; let's talk about it anyway.

Instead of presenting some pretty brutal statistics regarding fire at home, at work, or on the boat, I thought I'd just use this article to remind you of a few fire safety tips that you may or may not remember.

The first one is a "procrastinator's special". When you set your clocks back for winter, change those 9-volt batteries in your smoke detectors. *Sure, no problem; I'll take care of it next Tuesday.*

Another tip isn't so obvious. Take a moment and think of the floor plans in your house and boat. Could someone find themselves in a "trap" at various locations if a fire took place? These areas would be ideal locations for fire extinguishers. They are relatively inexpensive but could be worth their weight in gold.

We know, however, that in many cases the smoke from a fire is the real danger. Fire extinguishers can't help us with eliminating or negotiating deadly smoke. Smoke detectors placed at critical areas (*a key point*) can be your greatest ally. Your local fire company might be selling smoke detectors for a reasonable cost.

At this time I'd like to introduce another tip; something *really* inexpensive. It's called a fire plan, and it could be in the form of a very simple, but meaningful discussion with members of your household. Talk about what you would do if caught in a room with smoke seeping through the cracks of the door. Smoke in most cases will rise so crawling on the floor alongside the wall might be your best method of escape. You might want to discuss escape routes and methods out of each "trap" in your house (bedrooms in particular), and discuss how you could exit your way to safety.

A sidetrack, if you don't mind. My wife and I would take the kids to Washington, D.C. every year for a long weekend. We'd stay at a Marriott on the 10^{th} + floor for the view. As we entered our hotel room, my wife would play a game with the kids. "Where are the exits on this floor?" (Over there, and there, and there) "Which exit would we take if we had to leave our room because of fire and smoke?" (That one over there; it's the closest) "How would we get to the exit?" (We'd go along the wall and stay close to the floor). Then the kids would crawl along the wall until they got to the exit. It was a "fun thing". Over the years, it got to the point where our kids would ask us the questions, and we all would all crawl along the wall. The things you do for your kids!

I'll probably hear about this next tip from every animal lover/owner in the squadron. Humans are more important than animals! While you're discussing the things to do during a fire situation, you might want to bring up what to do with Muffy the cat, Rex the dog, or whatever pets you might have in the house. This could be a very delicate subject with small kids and some "confused adults." If you can get to your pet without putting yourself in harm's way, that's fine. Jeopardizing your own life to save Muffy or Rex isn't a good idea. By the way, the animals would probably be able to get out of the house faster than you. They don't like smoke and fire either! It might also be a good idea to abandon any thoughts of searching for the kids' favorite toys.

The second-last tip: Does everyone in your household know how to call 911, or what to use to call 911? Answer – Regular phones, cell phones, and hollering to your neighbor. You might want to make up a little note with what to say when you contact a 911 operator. Every second counts.

The last tip: Try not to turn yourself into a firefighter. If the place is ablaze, get out! The fire may

You can often see these flags on the Chesapeake Bay in the areas of Solomon Island, Baltimore Harbor, and at the western end of the C&D canal.

A third flag that I really didn't want to see was the solid red swallow tail flag indicating the loading or unloading, or carrying dangerous cargo onboard. In this case the vessel was underway and the flag indicated that it was carrying dangerous cargo.
