Monday 20 June: Shaw Bay to St. Michaels

WSPS Summer Cruise 2016 Sail Rallye Events

Conditions for this year's sail rallyes were once again as varied as one could imagine with light air to fresh breeze in the twenty knot range to dead calm. This year we tried a new and less formal procedure in which boats timed their own starts and finishes with a set "window" of time for the start each day from 0930 to 0945. Four rallyes were held with excellent participation from among the seven sailboats on the cruise. On most days, everyone at least started the rallye and we had five boats complete the series by finishing at least three courses. Three of the boats completed the rallyes on all four days, namely, *Brio, Mystic Star* and *Novus*. Courses for the rallyes were laid out generally along the paths between the various evening destinations, and allowed sailors to experience some friendly competition without diverting too far from the course to their afternoon anchorages or ports of call.

The winds for Monday's rallye held to predictions of 5 knots at the start but fell off from there. Since the day's cruise plan only involved a short trip from Shaw Bay on the Wye River to St. Michaels, the planned rallye course of 9.9 nm had us circling the shoals at the mouths of the Miles and Wye Rivers and included a leg north to the buoy off of Tilghman Pt. The lack of wind caused us to eliminate this leg to shorten the course; however, by noon it was clear that we weren't going to complete even the shortened course. Boats had been asked to record their times at intermediate marks and the third mark, only 2.0 nm from the start, was used as the finish for the day. Six of the seven boats toughed out the slowing conditions with finishing order: *Mystic Star, Gypsy II, Brio, Eau de Vie, Novus* and *Pleasure's Mine*.

Tuesday started off with a more accommodating amount of wind at 5 to 10 knots SW. The course of 10 nm was right along our path from St. Michaels across to the Rhode River and allowed for a fast reach to Tilghman Pt following by a beat down Eastern Bay to the finish SE of Bloody Pt. Six boats finished the rallye at around noon or shortly thereafter, then most continued a great sail across the Bay to find security at anchor just prior to a series of heavy thunderstorms. Finish on corrected time was: *Gypsy II, Mystic Star, Weatherly, Brio, Novus* and *Eau de Vie*.

The winds shifted westerly and increased on Wednesday as we made our way from the Rhode River to Back Creek, Annapolis. The rallye involved a course to the NE on a broad reach past Thomas Pt. Lt. and across the Bay to the ship channel, then upwind to a mark in the mouth of the Severn River. Boats were flying off the wind as the wind speed increased past 15 knots and by the time the downwind mark was reached, boats were faced with 20+ knots on a beat back across to Annapolis. This proved to be a bit more wind than several boats were interested in battling and only four ended up finishing: *Mystic Star, Weatherly, Novus* and *Brio*.

Thursday turned into a layover day due to predicted continuous rains, so the rallye course that was planned for Thursday was run on Friday. (Continued next page)

The course involved a loop out into the Bay south of the Bay Bridge covering 7.3 nm and we experienced northerly winds of 4-8 knots. A difference of only 4 seconds in elapsed time separated first and second place, but *Weatherly* came out well ahead on corrected time: *Weatherly*, *Mystic Star*, *Gypsy II*, *Brio*, and *Novus*.

The best three rallye results were considered for each boat in order to determine their score for the series. *Mystic Star* finished in overall first with two first place finishes and one second place. *Weatherly* and *Gypsy II* were tied for second with both boats recording first, second and third place finishes. In such a case, the rules require that the placing in the last race of the series breaks the tie, which gave *Weatherly* overall 2nd. Congratulations and thanks to all the participants who made this year's cruise rallyes a most enjoyable event with no drama!

Education Department ~ The Spirit of Learning

How is your summer going? Getting out on the boat enough? And are you feeling confident and going where you want to go? Maybe you are finding that some skills are rusty, or worse you never had those skills. Boating education gives confidence and the Wilmington Sail and Power Squadron is here to help...if you tell us what you need or want to know.

Boating is a complicated business with engines and/or sails for power, finding the way to where you want to be, rules for staying out of the way of others, electronics to manage the navigation information and for communication. How about the skills to set an anchor securely so you can stay put in a strong thunderstorm like the one we experienced on the Rhode River during the annual squadron cruise in June? Are you comfortable when you tie up your boat and leave it until the next weekend? We have people who can teach you about all of these things.

We can teach you in the multi-week advanced grade and electives program that have been the mainstay of the United States Power Squadrons for over a hundred years, or we can teach or review particular skills in two hour seminars. There are over twenty of these short classes with prepared materials and Power Point presentation aids. There is no better place to learn than in a class with students and a teacher with real life experience.

The education program is fully described in our squadron yearbook on pages 23-31. Take a look at the course descriptions and seminar topics and let me know what would interest you or suggest other topics that aren't listed. The squadron calendar notes that our advanced grades and elective courses begin on Tuesday, October 18th. Boating Safety News - Boating Accidents

In 2015 the Coast Guard counted 4,158 accidents (+2.3%) that involved 626 deaths (2.6%), 2613 injuries and approximately \$42 million dollars of damage to property as a result of recreational boating accidents.

This fatality rate was 5.3 deaths per 100,000 registered recreational vessels. This rate represents a 1.9% increase from 5.2% fatality rate of per 100,000 registered

recreational vessels.

Compared to 2014, the number of accidents increased 2.3%, the number of deaths increased 2.6%, and the number of injuries increased 2.4%.

Where cause of death was known, 76% of fatal boating accident victims drowned. Of those drowning victims with reported life jacket usage, <u>85%</u> were not wearing a life jacket. Where Instruction was known, 71% of deaths occurred on boats where the operator had not received boating safety instruction. Only 15% of deaths occurred on vessels where the operator had received a nationally-approved boating safety education certificate.

There were 158 accidents in which at least one person was struck by a propeller. Collectively, these accidents resulted in 27 deaths and 150 injuries.

Eight out of every ten boaters who drowned were using vessels less than 21 feet in length. Operator inattention, improper lookout, operator inexperience, excessive speed, and machinery failure rank as the top five primary contributing factors in accidents.

Alcohol use is the leading known contributing factor in fatal boating accidents; where the primary cause was known, it was listed as the leading factor in 17% of deaths.

Twenty-two children under age thirteen lost their lives while boating in 2015. Twelve children (55%) died from drowning. Two children (17%) of those who drowned were wearing a life jacket; half of the remaining 10 children who were not wearing a life jacket were not required to do so under State law.

Where data was known, the most common types of vessels involved in reported accidents were open motorboats (45%), personal watercraft (19%), and cabin motorboats (17%).

Where data was known, the vessel types with the highest percentage of deaths were open motor-boats (46%), canoes (11%), and kayaks (12%).

The 11,867,049 recreational vessels registered by the states on 2015 represent a 0.5% increase from last year when 11,804,002 recreational vessels were registered.

Cooperative Charting

The US Coast Guard, the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), and the Department of Transportation (DOT) have released a Federal Register Notice announcing a reduction of the Nationwide Differential Global Positioning System (NDGPS).

This planned reduction calls for the shutdown and decommissioning of 37 DGPS sites, leaving 46 operational sites available to users in coastal areas.

Summary: The Nationwide Differential Global Positioning System (NDGPS) service augments GPS by providing increased accuracy and integrity using land-based reference stations to transmit correction messages over radio-beacon frequencies. The service was implemented through agreements between multiple Federal agencies including the United States Coast Guard (USCG), Department of Transportation (DOT), and United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), as well as several states and scientific organizations, all cooperating to provide the combined national DGPS utility. However, a number of factors have contributed to declining use of NDGPS. Based on an assessment by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), DOT, and USACE, the agencies will shutdown and decommission 37 DGPS sites, which will leave 46 operational sites available to users in coastal areas.

Termination of the NDGPS broadcast at the 37 sites is planned to occur on August 5, 2016.

The WSPS Executive Committee has had several conversations about the future of the Squadron - assuring it's a valued experience for existing members and recruiting new members. Like other squadrons, the average member is older and the membership has declined. Many things have changed in the last 30 years. We have the internet, substantial use of social media. Millennials, gen Xers think and act differently; the middle class is shrinking and more organizations are competing for our time.

We need to take some action, so on July 6th, Wendy and Mike King hosted the Executive Committee and their spouses for a dinner and meeting to discuss growing WSPS. The group listed and prioritized their ideas around two questions. The issues that received the most support are as follows:

Question: What are the barriers/problems with getting new members/retaining existing members?

- Affordability for new members.
- Lack of awareness of the Squadron in our communities
- Younger people are buying fewer boats
- Younger people don't want to join groups of senior citizens
- Power Squadrons need to redefine their goals
- The Squadron needs awareness of different age groups

Question: What do we do to increase membership?

- Provide WSPS business cards for all members to facilitate introductions and engagement
- Marketing with Cabela's for exposure and offering seminars
- Use Power of One personal relationships to engage others
- Increase education courses to be offered.
- Reach out to private boating groups and explore partnerships

The group acknowledged that the causes of declining membership are not simple. Similarly, the solutions to address our problems are not simple and will require a broad strategy.

We know that we did not cover all the bases in our first discussion. We would value feed-back, ideas and recommendations from all Squadron members. If you are interested, we can provide you the full work product of the first meeting. Our success requires we engage existing, new and prospective boaters. We also believe our success is rooted in the involvement of the whole Squadron.

Philadelphia River Cruise

Would you be interested in a nice cruise of a near-by harbor, with dinner, good company and some boating education thrown in? Try the annual May cruise on the Benjamin Franklin Yacht that is sponsored each year by the Delaware River, Delhigh, Kingsway and Main Line Power Squadrons. Three couples from WPS attended this year - Wendy and Mike King, Chris and Mark Atkinson and Leslie Brower and Bruce Wyngaard.

While the boat captain narrated about shipping, harbor skyline highlights, navigation aids, designated squadron members took stations on the top deck to make themselves available to demonstrate their different expertise and interests. It was informal and relaxed.

A chart of the harbor was available to answer questions about plotting and identifying navigation markers. There were demonstrations on hand-held compasses, the operation of the sextant, GPS, how to use the I-Pad as a chart plotter, and aids to navigation including pointing out the range markers that are used for boats going south and north on the river. The complexity of navigating on a crowded harbor at night was underscored by a large tug boat and barge overtaking our boat. Mixed in the night skyline were the lights of the tug boat which we did not see until he was about a hundred yards behind our boat. Understanding boat navigation lighting would have given us an earlier warning.

A fun quiz was handed out that had navigation questions answered by the captain. The squadron instructors took time to mix with people from other squadrons - they had a good time also.

Consider participating next year. The buffet was excellent and in good quantity. Parking was easy. It's an inexpensive way of taking a dinner cruise and someone else is doing the steering. It's always fun to see a city from the perspective of the river. We passed the battleship New Jersey, saw new industrial facilities on the NJ side and visible planets in the night sky. You see and hear the commercial dock activity, the weaving of recreation and commercial boat traffic and the city lights you cannot see from the shore.

4th Annual WSPS Crab Feast


